Reading for today **Matthew 14: 22-33**

²²Immediately he (Jesus) made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. ²³And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, ²⁴but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them.

²⁵And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. ²⁶But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. ²⁷But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."



²⁸Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." ²⁹He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. ³⁰But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" ³¹Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" ³²When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

A Message for Today

We have certainly had our share of wild storms lately, haven't we? Some have been storms that did instil some fear in my heart, and our dog sure wasn't happy with them, either. Chick and I used to have a small bichon-lhasa aspo dog. Loud thunder sent her cowering under our bed or into the corner of our bathroom. Not so much Belmont, the Tan-Black American Hound Dog that lives with us now. You would think she would be braver, if her size had anything to do with the matter. She doesn't cower under the bed. What she does do, however, is stand at the window and bark at the thunder and lightening. She's a hound-dog. She has a very loud bark! So if the thunder and lightening doesn't keep you on edge, the barking certainly does.

If our animals don't make us more aware of the impending storms, our cell phones do. Mine gives me alerts – heat warnings, storm warnings...and most of us also get those loud alarms that signal approaching tornados, too. All in the name of preparing us, yet sometimes I think all those warning apps to is cause us to fear.

All that said, when I am safe at home, I do like to sit on the deck and watch those dark clouds come in, and listen to the heavy rain falling on the world around me. Only a few times have I wondered if I needed a boat. And knowing the safety of the house is just steps away is really assuring.

That image of the boat that we find in today's gospel is rich in metaphorical meaning. When you are really in doubt, or afraid of something, you indeed can feel like you're sinking, like your boat is taking on water, and you no matter how fast you bail, water keeps coming in. The cause of fear or doubt can be overwhelming.

As the Season's of the Spirit Fusion curriculum says this week:

“We have allowed fear and self doubt to diminish our courage. We have allowed our past experiences of failure to define how we see the future.”

Have you ever experienced a time in your life when the storms seemed to outnumber the calm times? Times when you just lived each day wondering when the next shoe would drop? Or perhaps even those times when things were going SO well that you began to fear that the next turn would bring something challenging.

Where do you see God – in the fearful times, the times of chaos?

And where do you see God when things are going well? Or do you see God then? Do you look for God in the good times, or only when you're in trouble?

I know how easy it is to let me spiritual practise fall by the way side when life is going good. I fill my time with things that come my way, with work and family and friends, and spiritual practise seems too often to be the thing I let go of when life is filled with moments of smooth sailing – to continue with the boating metaphor.

But when life gets stormy, when I seem to be facing challenge after challenge – well, it's then that I find myself seeking God, praying more fervently, and...re-setting my spiritual practise schedule.

Jesus, in this passage, had been teaching and preaching with crowds of people. They were people seeking to know God, people eager to learn, people longing to hear the good news the Jesus and his disciples had to share.

Being that kind of leader that people flock to, as in this story, must have been exhausting. Each encounter, each crowd, each lesson and story, each moment of healing, would have involved energy and emotion that would have taken a lot from Jesus' own spirit. I imagine that is why he retreats up the mountain alone to pray, and to connect with his God.

In my own practise of ministry, doing that has become very important – taking Sabbath time to renew and restore myself for the journey. In so many vocations, taking care of body and soul in order to serve others well is vitally important.

Yet, it's Jesus' re-appearance to the disciples that causes fear. They've weathered a storm without him, and even though the winds have carried their boat well away from Jesus, he finds them in the morning. The story tells us the disciples think Jesus is a ghost. There could be all sorts of reasons for that – but sometimes I think we need to suspend reason and accept the mystery of the story – and look for the deeper meaning in the mystery.

Jesus' presence that morning, out on the water, caused the disciples to be afraid, and to doubt who he was – that is, until Peter asks for some sign – asks to be invited out of the boat and onto the water to be with Jesus. Remember the other doubter we read about – Thomas, in the Easter story – who needed to see and feel to believe. Jesus doesn't condemn them for their doubt – he accepts their doubt, their questions, and gives them hope, and reason to have faith.

We all come to faith, come to belief, in different ways. Peter, he needed an experience, he needed Jesus' invitation, and perhaps even the touch of his hand as Jesus reached out to keep Peter from sinking into the water.

When we have doubts or fears, when we are questioning our faith, are wonderings, our questions are acceptable – for it is in seeking understanding, in seeking moments of touching the hand of Christ that our faith can be strengthened, and our spirits renewed and restored for the journey of faith and discipleship.

In these days that we are living – may we recommit ourselves to taking time, like Jesus did, to retreat with God, to pray and renew our bodies and our souls. And may we trust that God is sailing with us, through storm and sunshine. Amen.

This Week's Minute for Mission

We have learned that intergenerational trauma runs deep. The legacy of Indian Residential Schools continues to affect every generation as Indigenous parents struggle to educate their children in the ways of their people. In spring 2018, six youth travelled from Winnipeg to Sagkeeng First Nation in Fort Alexander,

Manitoba, to attend a Zam-mi-nan aki (“Touch the Earth”) cultural retreat at the world-renowned Turtle Lodge. At the three-day retreat, Elders taught the youth some of their traditional teachings to reconnect them with their culture. We are thankful that through our gifts we can offer opportunities for healing to young people experiencing intergenerational trauma.
